## Brits Hold their Own and Bash Aussies in Their Back Yard

A record number of Top British Freestyle skiers have headed 'down under' to train and compete in Australia during the winter season. The Brits are competing in the Aussie Continental Cup series - equivalent to Europe's Europa Cup.

In the first two rounds of mogul competitions this weekend at Mount Hotham, Victoria, eleven young Brits, 8 males and 3 females, challenged some of the world's best in their attempt to win the Series and make Olympic qualification.

On the Australia Drift piste, a 163m bump slope, they spun and jumped down the course in under 20 seconds.

Mogul skiing is judged on the quality of the turns (50% of marks), the skill and difficulty of 2 jumps landed into the moguls (25%) and on speed (25%). A top 5 place in the Australian events over the next month means the athletes will be considered for Olympic selection. The British Olympic Association will select the British team for the Salt Lake in February 2002 from those who have met qualification criteria by January 2002.

British A Team members Joanne Bromfield (18, Salt Lake City) and Sam Temple (29, Oxford) have already met the international critera from previous events. Joanne placed 5<sup>th</sup> in Round 1 and took the bronze medal in Round 2. Sam skied into 12<sup>th</sup> place from a field of 37 in Round 1 but illness prevented him competing in Round 2.

The third A Team member, Simon Bates (24, Edinburgh) was the top British male both days, achieving 9<sup>th</sup> in Round 1 and 10<sup>th</sup> in Round 2.

'I got the speed right both days and pulled two good jumps on Saturday but my turns weren't so good. On Sunday the turns improved but I didn't manage to float my heli round so lost a point there', reported Simon.

Two young men to watch from the English team are Martin Nankoo (19, Kent) and Andy Bennett (17, Kneesall). Martin made the final 16 in Round 1 and Andy skied into 11<sup>th</sup> place in Round 2. Andy's comments on his first Australian event were

'I took too much speed into the second air for my triple twister and cleared the landing by 3 bumps on Saturday'
